DUENDE

Natasha Lisitsa and Daniel Schultz

he Centro Flamenco is situated within the Posada del Potro, a museum dedicated to the most typical and loved 'performance art' in Andalusia, the flamenco. The design of Natasha and Daniel was inspired by the dramatic, sensual movement of a flamenco dancer wearing a bata de cola, a flamenco dress with a long train that elongates the dancer's profile and enables her to make voluminous, flowing movements. Duende is a unique Spanish word that refers to the passion moving a dancer in the context of flamenco. With their creation, Natasha and Daniel tried to evoke the spirit, the emotion and the movement of a flamenco dancer.

Upon entering the Posada de Potro through the small door opening, the attention of the visitor was drawn to the clear and colourful abstract creation within the walls of a serene, old patio. There was a certain drama between the old and the new, the serene and the lively. The creation was specifically designed so that the visitor would get a complete new perspective from every angle. The form of the sculpture points to the outstretched arms of a dancer.


DUENDE was constructed with the signature technique of Natasha and Daniel: a self-supporting structure of 500 pieces of perforated aluminium with a red finish. The aluminium was bent in such a way that it appears to be made out of fabric. Hidden in the metal structure are water bottles containing water for the flowers.

Natasha and Daniel selected Spanish red for the structure and soft female pink tints for the flowers. They used 5700 flower stems in total. 500 Gloriosa, 200 Phalaenopsis, 2750 roses, 500 Nerines, 500 Freesia and 1250 Dianthus.

For Loose Leaf Wona Bae (Muahn, South Korea) and Charlie Lawler (Hobart, Australia) the change works in a strengthening and liberating way. Like in nature, change gives us a lot of opportunities. Loose Leaf studies plants and flowers that have passed their "optimum beauty". All phases of the growing process are important, not just the flowering period.
